 \*If you are age 65 or older and a lawful permanent resident for 20 or more years, you may study just the 20 questions marked with an asterisk. The officer will ask up to 10 of these questions. You must answer 6 out of 10 (60%) correctly. Or you may take the test in the language of your choice.

### 2008 (Current) Test:

The USCIS Officer will ask up to 10 of these 100 questions. You must answer 6 correctly (60%) to pass the test.\*

\*If you are age 65 or older and a lawful permanent resident for 20 or more years, you may study just the 20 questions marked with an asterisk. Or you may take the test in the language of your choice.
